

School Lunches

Sacred Heart is a nut free school.

Lunchtime begins at 12.00 noon for Key Stage 1 and 12.15 pm for Key Stage 2. Key Stage 1 children eat at the first sitting, followed by Key Stage 2. Meals are prepared on the premises by Hertfordshire Catering who offer a well-balanced and nutritious menu.

The menu is varied and each day the children have a choice between three hot meals (one is always vegetarian) or a packed lunch option, followed by a choice of dessert.

Our children are also able to opt for the Wednesday roast dinner and / or Friday 'fun' lunch.

If your child has special dietary requirements, our Cook will almost certainly be able to cater for them. School meals are paid for in advance on a weekly, half-termly or termly basis. Payment should be made via SchoolGateway, an electronic payment system (see School Office for details). If your child is absent from school you are not charged for the meal.

Universal Free School Meals

For children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2

The Government has introduced a scheme for Free School Meals for all children attending the first three years at school.

This initiative is seen as a major scheme to improve eating habits in the young, with evidence showing a significant link between a good diet and a positive impact on performance at school. Pilot projects which tested universal free school meals showed that they give your child a real appetite for learning and help them to achieve their full potential. Should you choose to take up this entitlement, your child will receive a hot, freshly prepared nutritious meal each school day, prepared by skilled HCL staff.

Year 3 and Older

Your child may qualify for a free meal if you receive any of the following:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseekers Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Child Tax Credit,
- State Pension Credit (Guarantee Credit)
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Working Tax Credit run-on
- Universal Credit

Packed Lunches

Your child may choose to bring their own lunch to school. We would ask that lunches are healthy and you do not include sweets, fizzy drinks or nuts/nut-based products to safeguard our children with food allergies. Please refer to the School Lunch section on the website or ask for a copy from the Office.

Milk

Milk is available at a subsidised rate for all children in the school.

Parents will be informed of the cost per term. If your child is eligible for free school meals they will also receive free milk.

We would recommend that your child has milk as part of their diet.

Drinking Water

Children should bring a filled, plastic water bottle with them to school each day. It should be clearly labelled with their name and taken home at the end of the day. Please do not put them in the freezer as this has health and safety implications.

Water is also provided to all children with their lunch.

Fruit and Vegetable Scheme

To help parents promote healthy eating at an early age, the Government provides all Foundation and Key Stage 1 children with a free piece of fruit or vegetable which is eaten at morning break.

Break-time Snacks

Key Stage 2 children may bring a piece of fruit to school to eat at morning break. Please do not allow them to bring a fruit or cereal bar as a substitute.

Part 3 Curriculum



What is the National Curriculum?

The National Curriculum is a framework used by all maintained schools to ensure that teaching and learning is balance and consistent. All children aged 5 to 16 in state and maintained school must be taught according to the National Curriculum.

It sets out:

- The subjects taught
- The knowledge, skills and understanding required in each subject
- Standards or attainment targets in each subject that teachers can use to measure how your child is progressing and plan their future learning
- How your child's progress is assessed and reported Within this framework, schools are free to plan and organise teaching and learning in the way that best meets the needs of pupils. Similar to many schools, Sacred Heart school uses a cross curricular approach based on a theme for foundation subjects (History, Geography, DT, Art) teaching in a creative way.

National Curriculum Key Stages (Since 2014)

Every state -funded school must offer a curriculum which is balanced and broadly based and which:

- Promotes the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of pupils at the school and of society, and
- Prepares pupils at the school for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of later life.

The school curriculum comprises all learning and other experiences that each school plans for its pupils. The national curriculum forms one part of the school curriculum.

Key Stages

The national curriculum is organised into blocks of years called 'key stages' (KS). At the end of each key stage, your child's teacher will formally assess their performance to measure your child's progress.

Foundation Stage - Reception Class

The early years foundation stage (EYFS) sets standards for the learning, development and care of your child from birth to 5 years old. In Reception, (4 to 5 years) children cover the areas of learning set out below.

Areas of learning

Your child will mostly be taught through games and play. The areas of learning are:

- Communication and language
- Physical development
- Personal, social and emotional development
- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding the world
- Expressive arts and design

Children are aged between 5 and 7 and they are taught in Years 1 and 2.


Children are aged between 8 and 11 and they are taught in Years 3, 4, 5 and 6.







The Sacred Heart Curriculum Wheel



Our curriculum at Sacred Heart is knowledge rich, with Christ at the centre of all we do. We want our children at Sacred Heart to be independent thinkers, resilient, enabled to solve problems whilst following the Gospel Values.

The three core areas which are important is our teaching of the Gospel Values, the core skills of reading, writing and maths as well as the wellbeing of each child. Surrounding this are learning behaviours which are important in all aspects of life

Religious Education

Although Religious Education (RE) part of the National is not Curriculum, it is statutory and as a Catholic school we attach the greatest importance to it in the everyday life of the school. This not only applies to specific RE lessons but in the everyday interaction of school life, assemblies, meal times, playtimes and all the relationships that exist throughout the school. The Parish Priest is a regular visitor to the school and leads Liturgies and Masses with the children. Parents have the right to withdraw their children from RE lessons and acts of collective worship.



Relationships and Sex Education

Education for Relationships and Sex Education, (RSE) is taught through the programme., 'Live Life to the Full'. This is taught throughout the school from Foundation Stage to Year 6. Owing to the sensitive nature of this issue, Years 4, 5 and 6 parents are invited to a meeting to preview the content and materials before the lessons. The policy can be found on the website and is highlighted at the curriculum evening at the beginning of each academic year.

Meditation

In addition to the curriculum, every class partakes in a daily short meditation after lunch.

Assessment

One of the features of the new National Curriculum is that it no longer uses a system of numbered 'levels' to describe children's attainment. This is because it was felt by the DfE that the use of levels had at times been detrimental to children. For example, talking to children about their attainment using numbered levels could contribute towards their developing a "fixed mind-set" about their ability, whereas we want to foster in all our children a "growth mind-set", meaning that we believe that we can all improve our abilities with practice, effort and persistence.

We would also like to further enrich our pupils' learning by developing a greater breadth of skills and knowledge, so that they are confident to apply their skills to different areas of the curriculum, rather than focus on moving to the 'next level'.

Pupils will still be familiar with their 'next steps' learning targets as a way of ensuring maximum opportunity for progress but there will be no emphasis on what numerical level they are working at.

This national change – the removal of levels – means that, when we discuss your child's attainment with you, either in meetings or written reports, we will no longer be reporting levels, as these no longer have any relevance to the curriculum. Instead we will refer to your child's current level of attainment using phrases such as:

- Age Related Expectations (ARE)
- working within ARE for his/her age
- working beyond ARE

We will also comment on whether your child has made good progress over the year, and give details of any specific areas of the curriculum where he/she has achieved well and any areas where further development or support is needed. We trust that you will continue to find the information we provide about your child's education useful and informative. Please do not hesitate to speak to us if you would like to know more details about how your child is progressing in school.

Parent/Teacher Consultation Evenings

Parents are invited into School to discuss their child's progress and achievements with the Class Teacher on Parent/Teacher Consultation Evenings. These take place in the Autumn and Spring Terms when a choice of times are offered to ensure that all parents are able to attend.

Curriculum Evening

At the beginning of each academic year, parents are invited to a meeting where the new class teacher outlines the curriculum and expectations for the year.

There is also opportunity to meet members of the school Governing Body, FOSH (our Parent/ Teacher Association) as well as the Headteacher and other members of staff.

You will receive information about the progress your child is making and the level your child is working through the, parent consultation evening in February and an end of year report in July. Your attendance at these events encourages your child to work well and gives them a great sense of pride.

End of Year Report

Towards the end of the Summer Term, each child receives and end of year progress and attainment report.

Ad-hoc Teacher Meetings

We have an open door policy at Sacred Heart with teachers being available through appointment after school to discuss any matters.



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Educational Needs

The school believes that each pupil has individual and unique needs. However, some pupils require more support than others to help them achieve.

Some of these pupils may require help throughout their time school, while others may need a little extra support for a short period to help them overcome more temporary needs.

If pupils are to achieve their full potential we recognise this and plan accordingly. The school aims to provide all pupils with strategies for dealing with their needs in a supportive environment and give them meaningful access to the National Curriculum.

At all levels of educational needs, there is a continual partnership between the school, parents, and pupils. The children are monitored on their progress and outside agencies may be brought in to assess and support the children, school and parents.

Disability Admissions

of provisions Under the the Disability Discrimination Act 1995 (DDA) parents should be aware that the school is required to ensure that any application received should be without treated fairly and discrimination.

The DDA requires the school to ensure that there is access for disabled pupils (not only into school but to the curriculum) and that any disabled pupil is not treated less favourably than other pupils.

The DDA defines a disabled person as one who has a physical or mental impairment that has substantial and long-term adverse effect on a person's ability to carry out normal day to-day activities. This would include, for example, sensory impairments, affecting sight and hearing, learning disabilities, severe disfigurements and progressive conditions where impairments are likely to become substantial. Within the meaning of the Act a significant proportion of those who disabled will have special educational needs.

Extra-Curricular Activities

Extra-curricular activities play an important role at Sacred Heart Catholic Primary School. Parents of children who are engaged in after-school activities will be notified in writing the time that their children should be collected. We may ask for help transporting children to and from team sport events. We currently offer: Football, Netball, Basketball, Cricket, Athletics, Karate, Irish Dancing, Choir, ComputerXplorers and Art club.

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Educational Visits

We organise an annual residential school Journey for our Year 6 pupils to enhance the Summer Curriculum.

A residential visit is also organised for Year 4 to study geography at the Norfolk Coast.

All classes have educational visits to enhance their learning as part of their areas of study.

We arrange external visits and visitors to school, both of which enrich the children's learning.

Breakfast Club

We offer a Breakfast Club from 7:50 to 8:45 am daily in the School Hall.

Children are offered cereal, toast, yoghurts, fruit and fruit juice. After eating children are offered a wide range of activities. Fees: £4.00 per day per child.

After School Club

We have an After School Club on site, run by Little Blue Van.

This runs from 3.15 pm until 6.00pm.

All information is through Little Blue Van whose details can be found at the school office.

Part 4 Caring for Your Child



Safeguarding Children

Our school is committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children and expects all staff and volunteers to share this commitment.

This means that we have a Child Protection Policy and procedures in place.

This means that we have a Child Protection Policy and procedures in place. All staff (including volunteers and Governors) must ensure that they are aware of procedures, which include any volunteers in school being subject to a DBS Check.

All staff are interviewed and appointed in accordance with safer recruitment guidelines. Parents and Carers are welcome to read the Policy on request.

The school works in partnership with parents to support children in every way possible. However, the law places clear responsibility on schools to ensure that they work together with other agencies to safeguard and promote the welfare of all children.

As a result, if concerns arise within the school, or a parent reports a situation involving possible abuse, we would not be able to guarantee confidentiality. The matter would have to be referred on to Social Services. This is in line with Government and Hertfordshire policy.

Photographs of children may be taken during school activities and placed on our website. However, in the interests of security, first names only will be included. Any parents who object to their child being included should contact the school office.

We expect that any photographs taken by parents at school activities are for personal, family use only.



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Behaviour

Each class teacher has the pastoral responsibility for the care and welfare of the children in their own class.

The children are always supervised whether at work or play. The school works at promoting an environment that encourages positive behaviour.

Children are expected to behave in a courteous and sensible manner following our PUPIL'S CODE OF LEARNING:

Honesty is the best policy at all times.

Every day is a new beginning, with a new challenge to strive for.

Always use a growth mind-set in everything we do.

Respect each other and their talents.

Treat each other, as we would want to be treated

Behaviour which causes offence or hurt is not acceptable.

Bad language and inappropriate sexualised language will not be tolerated. Offending children will be reprimanded as appropriate to their age and their parents will be informed.

In our efforts to ensure good manners and behaviour we strive to lead by example – requesting rather than ordering and praising children's' efforts. The School has a Home-School Agreement for each child. This is signed by the Headteacher, Chair of Governors, parent and child. A copy of this can be found at the back of the Prospectus.

The School has a **Behaviour Policy and Anti-Bullying Strategy** which is published on the school's website.

At the start of each year, every class discusses the school's Behaviour Policy and agrees to follow the class agreement.

Reward Schemes Houses

To promote shared responsibility and a healthy spirit of co-operation, all children are organised into the above houses. Younger siblings who join the school will be placed in the same house as their brother/sister.

Restorative Practice

Our emphasis is upon supporting the child to make a good choice and on recognising (and praising) when this happens quickly to get them 'back on track'.

Whenever a child has caused harm, we support 'Time to Make Things Right' with a restorative conversation using our restorative questions. We encourage the child to take responsibility for their behaviour choices, to consider the impact on themselves and others and to plan how to respond more positively next time

Health Assessments

The School Nurse makes an annual visit to the **Foundation Class** to screen children's height, weight, vision and hearing and to **Year 6** for a height and weight check in line with the Local Health Authority care policy.

Parents are provided with written results.

Illness at School

All our staff are regularly trained in basic first-aid. Should your child become ill at school you (or your emergency contact) will be telephoned to collect them.

We ask that ill children are collected as soon as possible as the school has no facilities to look after ill children.

Headlice

If you notice your child has headlice please treat with medication recommended by your Pharmacist at the earliest opportunity. They must not return to school until that has been done.

Please inform the school office if your child is affected so that the class teacher is aware.

Medical Information

If your child has a serious or recurring medical problem, please inform the School. If your child has an allergy it is very important that the School is given all details and the necessary medication.

Accidents at School

If your child has an accident at School the same procedure will be followed as above. However, sometimes it may be necessary for us to act swiftly. We may seek further advice from the Doctor's Surgery or Hospital.

Sickness Guidelines

If your child has a stomach bug we ask that they do not return to school until 48 hours after the last bout of sickness.

If your child has chicken pox they must not return to school until all spots have scabbed over.

Please keep your contact list up to date so that we are always able to contact you in the case of an emergency.

It is not routine for our staff to administer medicine during the school day. This includes common proprietary medicines such as Calpol or paracetamol and prescribed antibiotics. If a child is on a course of antibiotics, the parent should either ask their GP for a three-dose course which eliminates the need for a lunchtime dose or they may personally come into school to administer a lunchtime dose.

Children with asthma or a nut allergy should have their inhaler or Epipen in school every day in a clearly named box.

In the case of a serious ongoing condition such as diabetes or epilepsy we seek advice from the School Nurse so that the child's needs are met. Arrangements for the latter should be made after discussion between the Headteacher and the parent.

There is a form available from the office for parents to complete if it is absolutely necessary for their child to receive prescribed medication during the school day. However, this is in exceptional circumstances only.

Children may not bring in self-administered medication such as throat sweets.

Educational Visits

Educational visits are arranged throughout the School year and provide valuable opportunities for social development and for learning experience. These however, can only take place if enough parents are able to make voluntary contributions.

Remission

In the event of financial difficulty parents are invited to discuss the with the Headteacher. matter Charges may be remitted in relation to the cost of residential trips in the case of pupils whose parents are entitled to Income Support, Incomebased Jobseekers' Allowance or Child Tax credits.

The Governors retain the right to grant remission of charges as determined by them, provided sufficient funds are available.

The School Building Fund

Catholic schools have been granted "voluntary aided" status. This means that, although the school is in the state system, it can organise itself on the basis of the teachings of the Church. In return for this, the school is required by the Government to raise 10% of the cost of maintaining and improving the school buildings and its facilities.

The School's Building Fund relies solely on the financial support of the parents who decide to send their children to a Catholic school. If your child comes to this school you are asked to make an annual contribution to the Building Fund.

Parents are required to contribute a minimum of £60.00 per academic year for one child or £90.00 per academic year per family. This can be paid either as a single annual amount or in instalments. Contributions can be made via SchoolGateway or standing order.

Gift Aid is a Government scheme that allows the school to reclaim the tax paid on contributions. Forms are available from the School Office.

All you have to do is to sign a form saying you are a UK taxpayer and that the tax you pay is more than the amount the school will reclaim. If you are a higher rate taxpayer you can claim additional tax relief on your annual tax return.

Parish Links

Our Parish Priest, Father Charles Cahill, is closely involved in Religious Education at this school and sits on our Board of Governors.

Father Charles is regular visitor to school, celebrating Mass at School or just having lunch with the children. All classes celebrate a Mass or liturgy each year.

The Parish undertakes the preparation for the sacraments of Reconciliation and First Holy Communion.



Parental Help

Parents are a great source of help at our School. Many come in on a regular basis to hear children read and to assist with other activities. Parent help is also appreciated for external trips.

If you are interested in helping please contact the School Office for a DBS (Disclosure & Barring Service) check form which needs to be processed before we are able to take up your kind offer. We also request that parents sign a volunteer agreement as in our Volunteers' Policy.

Assemblies/ Collective Worship

School and class assemblies, which are religious in character, take place regularly. At the beginning of each term parents and Governors are informed of the dates of class assemblies.
